
Governor's Summer Reading Challenge Grades 3-4

Camp by Kayla Miller



From the molten cracks below to the shimmering moon above, *Hello, Earth!* explores the wonders of the natural world. | Lexile: 660L




Stuntboy, in the Meantime by Jason Reynolds
