Response to the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School tragedy



In an effort to respect students, and the lives of those lost in the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School tragedy, the Tolland Public Schools are planning developmentally appropriate activities for students at each of our school levels. On March 14th the students and staff of Birch Grove Elementary and Tolland Intermediate School will engage in school-wide discussions of student health and safety. At Tolland Middle School students will participate in a moment of silence at 10:00 AM, and will engage in at least 17 minutes of service activities such as letter and card writing to students at MSDHS, banner creation for MSDHS, and/or letters to representatives expressing their feelings. At the High School there will be an assembly where students will have the opportunity to share their feelings.

School staff will keep an eye out for students who are suffering, and school counselors, psychologists, as well as teachers, paraprofessionals, and other staff will make sure that student needs are addressed. Please reach out to school counselors if you feel your son or daughter is experiencing any anxious feelings. The Superintendent's Breakfast for March 5th, 10:00 AM at the Central Office Building (51 Tolland Green) will be dedicated to a discussion of the safety and security protocols for the Tolland Public Schools, as well as the TPS response to the tragedy. Superintendent Soap-Box

I think we all share the sentiment that the last few weeks have been difficult. As adults we are asked to process more than sometimes it feels possible to do. I do not intend to make that process any harder - my intentions will always be to provide support, and above all, do no harm. For the bulletin this week I feel compelled, as Superintendents sometimes do, to get on my "soapbox."

In my opinion one of the things almost as egregious as violence is this world, is trying to find some profit off of that violence. As I write, I am not referring to makers of security products that enhance safety, so long as they do not through their actions or advertising make school systems or children vulnerable. I am not necessarily referring to news outlets who simply report the news and reflect authentically what is happening in the world. My focus for this newsletter is on a advertising-profit making survey company that contends to provide useful information to communities about "school security" readiness based on low sample response surveys, and in my opinion, a questionable aggregation of data they have available to them. The site sells advertising, and benefits from the number of "hits" the site receives as a result of sharing this shoddy information.

Even if one were to pretend that the information was somehow valuable and accurate in ranking school security, I question the judgment of putting out a list of the schools that purportedly have wanting levels of security. These are our *children* we are talking about – does this company really want to identify for any unhealthy individual or group that is giving some thought to hurting children, a list of which places would be easiest to breach? No matter how I roll this around in my mind, doing what this company did in creating these results, and what WFSB did through their news attention to it essentially promoting the results, is irresponsible. While writing about this is done at the risk of bringing more attention to the company, and sometimes whether they receive good or bad attention it is valuable to them because it expands people's knowledge of the brand, when the organization puts student safety in jeopardy I am willing to take that risk and call them out.

Tell them putting children in harm's way to get more web-site hits and sell some advertising is unconscionable.

Finally, here are some of the problems with the survey company referenced in the WFSB article:

Some basic issues with survey company information

1. Coercive marketing practices – without any real verification that the individual providing information is a student, parent, or guardian from the district they are reporting on, people can submit a rating. A school district can "claim their page" and in doing so, add some legitimacy to it – but this does little for the district and instead provides more traffic for the company to sell advertising. Therefore, districts feel compelled to participate, and it becomes one more thing that draws time away from educating children as districts attempt to illicit people to submit to the site to be more realistically represented in the ratings. Once other sites see this business model is successful, they too replicate it creating an even greater burden.

- 2. <u>Small sample sizes</u> Some important numbers are how many *people* have responded, and how many *responses* they have provided. If only thirty or forty people out of thousands of students, parents, and guardians (considering say only the current year's populations) are submitting the rating the accuracy is greatly limited because it is a small sample of *individuals*. This feeds into the first item as poor ratings based on small samples put pressure on a district to "play the game" and send more people to the site.
- 3. <u>Self-reports</u> (i.e. standardized test self-reports) much of the data is based on *self*-reports from unverified users. I use the term unverified here to mean there is no solid confirmation the people submitting the data are actually going to the Tolland Schools or are part of the Tolland community. Therefore, the data is being self-reported by unverified contributors.
- 4. <u>Big claims about data that are misleading</u>: The company will make claims such as "[we have] the most comprehensive data on U.S. Schools... we rigorously analyze dozens of public data sets and over 100 million reviews and survey responses" but don't say that for your particular district, it could be determined in part by the self-responses of a very small group of people, making it greatly inaccurate.




